June 19, or Juneteenth, is a holiday that commemorates the day the enslaved in Texas, the last Confederate state, learned of their freedom. It was 2½ years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation, marking the end of slavery in the United States in 1865. As soon as the following year, festivals were organized in African American communities to honor the significance of that day. Juneteenth festivals have continued across the United States into the 21st century. Prayer, speeches, picnics, and dancing are just some of the activities happening in modern day Juneteenth events. # JULY IS DISABILITY PRIDE MONTH

Disability Pride Month happens every July and coincides with the passing of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. On March 12, 1990, over 1,000 people marched from the White House to the U.S. Capitol to raise awareness and demand for significant changes for individuals with disabilities. When the group arrived at the Capitol many cast aside their wheelchairs and crawled up the Capitol steps to demonstrate how inaccessible architecture impacts people with disabilities. This event became known as the "Capitol Crawl." That same year the Americans with Disabilities Act was signed into law on July 26, 1990. Encompassing all abilities, ages, colors, nationalities, faiths, and socioeconomic backgrounds, people with disabilities constitute the largest and most diversified minority group in the population. Through sharing stories and personal experiences of the disabled population, Disability Pride Month aims to celebrate disability as an identity. Disability pride is an essential component of an inclusive and diverse community, as well as a direct response to systematic ableism and stigmatizing notions of disability. It is about taking pride in our identities not pleading for acceptance. Disability Pride Month is an opportunity to raise awareness within all organizations, businesses, and charities and advocate for a more accessible and inclusive world for people living with long-lasting health conditions, disabilities, or mental health conditions.



Progress has been made but there is so much more to be done. Disability should have a month of being in the spotlight to educate or at least make people think.

What can you do to celebrate Disability Pride?

- Educate yourself about policies that harm and help people with disabilities.
- Teach your kids to acknowledge and include people with disabilities.
- Shop disability-owned small businesses in your community.
